

More working families in N.D. can now get help with child care costs



N.D. has increased the qualifying income level for the Child Care Assistance Program to 85% of the state's median income

Child Care Assistance:

- Is paid to licensed/regulated child care providers for care provided to children of participating families.
- Can also help pay registration fees for some types of providers.

When Child Care is More Affordable:

- It is easier for parents to work.
- It is easier for businesses to hire and retain parents of young children as employees.
- It is easier for families to choose quality child care.
